Land Acknowledgement

Network Development

We aim to deepen our existing network connections and actively develop new relationships between individuals and organizations, especially among traditionally underrepresented communities, policy-makers, and groups. This year, we accomplished this through the following events and initiatives.

2022 Strategy Retreat at Sweet Beet Cafe

The Strategy Retreat is a time for actively engaged members of the NHFA network to provide guidance about how the Backbone Team can best support network partners. This year's retreat included 35 active network partners participating in four strategic conversations.

1. How do we better collaborate and communicate around policy to support our local and regional food system?

2. How can the Backbone Team amplify network partner communications efforts to better tell the story of the New Hampshire food system?

3. Why aren't BIPOC-led or focused organizations and communities well represented in the NH Food Alliance network? Where are there pockets of leadership happening in the state and how do we align around and support those?

4. How could the Backbone Team further or better support the sharing of information between network partners?

All Hands on Deck for New Hampshire's Seafood Industry

Creating stronger ties with New Hampshire's seafood industry, a historically siloed sector of the food system, was a priority for the NH Food Alliance team this past year.

- As a supporting partner of the New England Young Fishermen's Alliance (NEYFA), NHFA created state-based educational marketing content for NEYFA cohort members and connected the young fishermen with New Hampshire's food hubs and other viable markets.
- NH Sea Grant and UNH Extension co-hosted a series of conversations in spring 2023 to tease apart some of the complexities and challenges effecting New Hampshire's fishing and seafood industry. The NH Food Alliance Backbone Team participated in these conversations to gain a better understanding of where the network could lend insights and support in marketing, identifying infrastructure needs, advocacy and coalition building.



 In December 2022, NH Community Seafood experienced a series of challenges that put its future at risk. The NHFA network sprang into action in support, helping to prevent its dissolution. Through collaborative communications and networking, NH Community Seafood was able to establish a new Caretaker Board and eventually, hire a new Executive Director. In June 2023, the Board and Executive Director oversaw the relaunch of NH Community Seafood's Community Supported Fishery (CSF), continuing the cooperative distribution of local seafood to communities throughout the state.

Engaged Students with the Network through UNH Resources and Programs

As a program of the Sustainability Institute at the University of NH, the NH Food Alliance has a unique opportunity to connect its network with the students and resources of the University system. In 2023, NHFA did so in the following ways:

- Hired Isabel Cole ('25) as the first NH Eats Local intern
- Hosted a breakout session at the 2023 NH Food System Statewide Gathering that highlighted university resources and programs to help network partners build capacity in their work
- Created a resource page on the NHFA website for network partners to easily navigate the opportunities to engage with students and utilize university resources
- Judged the EcoGastronomy track at UNH's Undergraduate Research Symposium in April 2023
- Guest lectured in UNH Department of Agriculture, Nutrition, and Food Systems courses (for more, see page 11)

2023 NH Food System Statewide Gathering

The NH Food System Statewide Gathering is an annual event hosted by the NH Food Alliance that brings together individuals, businesses, and organizations from across sectors who are dedicated to growing an improved local food system that works for all in the Granite State. 2023 marked 10 years of the NH Food Alliance network; a milestone that was celebrated throughout the gathering in both moments of reflection and moments of looking forward.

Highlights of the gathering include:

- Three emerging young leaders welcomed attendees with their vision for the future of New Hampshire's food system by sharing stories about their own work and passion related to food, agriculture, and sustainability.
- Participants enjoyed an interactive workshop led by three journalists about how to pitch stories and build better relationships with the media.
- "Climate Resilience on NH Farms," a panel led and moderated by Amanda Littleton of the Cheshire County Conservation District, included four farmers from across the state who have implemented projects to build climate resilience on their farms through various funding sources.
- The "New to NH" breakout session introduced three new initiatives to the NHFA network: the NH Center for Justice and Equity, the North Country Agriculture and Food Council, and the Victory Garden Toolkit by Kearsarge Food Hub.
- In recognition of the NH Food Alliance's 10th Anniversary, Rebecca Brown, one of the founding network partners, shared stories from the start of the network and her hopes for the future.
- An afternoon celebration featured a raffle of prizes donated by local organizations and businesses, snacks and refreshments, lawn games, and a display of Vital Communities' Climate Farmer Stories project (a series of art and recordings showcasing farmers who are focused on climate-friendly practices).

Collaborative Action

We catalyze collaboration to find shared interests, advance policy changes, generate knowledge, and build collective solutions at the community, state and regional levels through the work of our action teams, workgroups, and the facilitation of various strategic meetings.

Supported the Agricultural Land Preservation Program

NHFA convened a quick response team to support the re-launch of the NH Department of Agriculture, Markets and Food's Agricultural Land Preservation (ALP) program. The team of farmland preservation experts, including staff from Southeast Land Trust (SELT) and American Farmland Trust, advised the adjustment of statutory language to allow land trusts to utilize ALP funds to protect agricultural land in New Hampshire through House Bill 221.

The team's work ensured that the \$1.2 million allocated to the ALP program will be eligible for matching funds through the National Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) and other funding sources, doubling the program

funding to \$2.4 million and doubling the impact of farmland conservation efforts in New Hampshire. At the time of publishing this annual report, House Bill 221 was approved by both the House and Senate and is awaiting signature at the Governor's office.

Supported Implementation of Local Food for Schools Cooperative Agreement

In early 2023, the NH State Department of Agriculture, Markets and Food accepted over \$558,000 in federal funding as part of the USDA's Local Food for Schools Cooperative Agreement Program. The funds will support local food procurement at New Hampshire schools with the highest need for free and reduced school lunch, shortening and strengthening local food supply chains in response to vulnerabilities exposed during the pandemic. The agreement funds can be used to purchase foods that are unprocessed and produced, raised, or caught in New England with emphasis on foods produced in New Hampshire by socially disadvantaged producers.



The NHFA Backbone Team is working with NH Farm to School, the NH Department of Agriculture, Markets and Food, and NH Hunger Solutions to support the successful dissemination of the agreement funds by streamlining connections between school food service directors and the farms and food hubs they can purchase from.

Aligned New Hampshire Food System Professionals around Policy

In December, the NHFA Backbone Team co-hosted the 2022 NH Agricultural Policy Forum with the Monadnock Farm & Community Coalition and the League of Conservation Voters. During the forum, national and state-level experts came together to discuss forthcoming federal and state legislation aimed at building an equitable and robust local food system in New Hampshire and beyond.

Secured American Rescue Plan Act funds for Meat Processing Infrastructure in NH

From 2021–2022, NHFA convened a group of network partners to develop and submit a three-project proposal for American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) State Fiscal Recovery Funds (SFRF); a project in support of building on-farm climate resilience through infrastructure implementation, a project investing in meat processing facilities, and a project supporting food hub infrastructure.

In fall 2022, the Governor's Office for Emergency Relief and Recovery awarded \$750,000 of ARPA SFRF to the meat processing facilities investment project. The NH Department of Agriculture, Markets and Food has successfully distributed the funds through a grant application process,



leading to the funding of eight meat processing projects across New Hampshire, an investment that will create a significant positive ripple effect for New Hampshire's meat producers and processors.

Envisioned the NH Food Hub Network as part of a Region

In the two years since NHFA began coordinating the NH Food Hub Network, it has become clear that New Hampshire's food hubs are best served through a regional food hub networking effort. New Hampshire is unique in its geographic and logistical connection to its neighboring states; New Hampshire is surrounded by robust agricultural areas and the state's central location makes it an integral partner in the movement of food around the New England region. Simultaneously, there has been a growing need for collaboration among food processors in the region to help food hubs gain access to institutional markets and diversify offeringss to retail and wholesale customers.

In response to the above needs, the NH Food Hub Network partnered with Healthcare Without Harm and Kitchen Sync Strategies, who have been working to establish a network of food processors called the Northeast Food Collective, to launch the New England Food Hub and Processors Network. The regional network helps identify and meet the needs and goals of food hubs, processors, and buyers through shared resource creation, organized communications, outreach, and regular network meetings.

Racial Equity Action Team

The NH Food Alliance continued to coordinate monthly meetings of its Racial Equity Action team. The team's mission is to promote racial equity in New Hampshire's food system and does so by supporting Food Solutions New England's 21–Day Racial Equity Habit Building Challenge, ensuring diverse voices are represented in the network, hosting and promoting equity-related educational events and resources, and serving as a community of practice for partners working to advance diversity, equity, inclusion, and justice in their communities and workplaces.

Climate and Food Action Team

NHFA continued to coordinate monthly meetings of its Climate and Food Action Team, which was formed in spring 2020 to bring together advocates at the intersection of climate resilience, food systems, emergency planning and policy development. The team served as an advisory committee for the 2022–2023 Network Café Series (see pages 12–13 for more) which was focused on ways to build a climate-resilient food system.

As of spring 2023, the NHFA Backbone Team is evaluating how to best support climate and food work in the food system, including a transition away from monthly team meetings to hosting an annual Climate and Food Forum to facilitate information sharing about, and community building around, climate and food related work in New Hampshire to a larger, more varied audience.

Regional Collaborations

NHFA continues to be a voice representing the New Hampshire food system in regional efforts— sharing learnings, projects, challenges and opportunities with our neighbors and colleagues from nearby states.

Food Solutions New England

The NH Food Alliance team engaged with the work of Food Solutions New England (FSNE) through support of the 21-Day Racial Equity Habit Building Challenge, participation in the FSNE Network Team and Network Leadership Institute, collaboration with FSNE's NH Racial Equity Ambassador, and participation in the New England FoodComms Community of Practice and the Strategic Collective Narrative (SCONE) workgroup, co-facilitated by FSNE.

Farm to Institution New England

The NH Food Alliance team engaged with other New England food systems advocates through participation in the 2023 Northeast Farm to Institution Summit Steering Committee, in addition to leading four presentations at the summit (see page 11 for details).

New England Feeding New England Project

The NH Food Alliance continued participation in the New England Food System Planners Partnership (NEFSPP), including:

- Supported the release and continued dissemination of the much-anticipated New England Feeding New England report, A Regional Approach to Food Systems Resilience
- Committed to spearhead the Local Food Count for New Hampshire; of which each New England state has committed to completing, utilizing a methodology developed by Vermont Farm to Plate



• Aided in the inclusion of representatives from each state's Department of Agriculture in the partnership; Joshua Marshall, Director of the Division of Agricultural Development for the NH Department of Agriculture, Markets and Food, joined as an official partner representing New Hampshire

Communications & Storytelling

We amplify the voices and missions of our network partners by developing communications platforms that reach food systems professionals as well as a broader audience. Our communications strategies include sharing tools and resources, as well as lifting up storytelling that advances food systems work throughout the state.

Launched NH Eats Local Team

In January 2023, the NHFA Backbone Team launched the NH Eats Local Team in response to the network's desire for a working group and community of practice focused on storytelling and communications.

The team's mission is to connect Granite Staters to New Hampshire agriculture and working waterfronts and inspire them to support their local farmers, fishermen, and food producers. The NH Eats Local Team does this by telling the stories of New Hampshire's food system through collaborative public relations efforts, aligning on "eat local" messaging and shared content, providing educational opportunities and hosting events.

Grew the Local Food Movement during 2022 NH Eats Local Month

NH Eats Local Month is a month-long consumer marketing campaign in support of New Hampshire grown, caught, and produced foods, hosted by the NH Food Alliance and its NH Eats Local Team, which includes the NH Department of Agriculture, Markets and Food. As part of the campaign, farms, restaurants, fisheries, farmers' markets, and other food businesses and organizations are invited to become promotional partners for NH Eats Local Month. For 2022 NH Eats Local Month, 78 businesses and organizations signed up to partner.



Live Free + Eat Local Challenge

The focus of 2022 NH Eats Local Month was the first ever Live Free + Eat Local Challenge. New Hampshire visitors and residents were challenged to eat at or from five New Hampshire farm, fish, or food businesses to be eligible to win a prize donated by local small businesses. Throughout August, participants in the challenge visited nearly 400 farm, fish, and food businesses across New Hampshire.



Learning & Leadership

We foster learning and skill-building among our network partners so that we can be effective leaders, collaborators, and advocates for change in our food system.

NH Food Systems News You Need to Know

NH Food Systems News You Need to Know, the NHFA's monthly newsletter, reaches nearly 2,300 subscribers. In addition to sharing information from NHFA, the newsletter delivers food system-focused events, news stories, jobs, grants, and other announcements from partners directly into the inboxes of our network. The information shared in each newsletter is housed on the Network News page on the NH Food Alliance website. The Network News page allows network partners to filter and search food system content from across New Hampshire and beyond, making information accessible and available to all.

Network Café Series

On the first Friday of each month, September through April, NHFA hosts an informal and lively conversation with partners from across the New Hampshire food system and beyond. Network Cafés cover critical issues in the local, regional, and even global food system, and are an opportunity for the NHFA team to respond nimbly to evolving issues, leading to further collaborations and projects, turning talk into action.

The 2022-23 Network Cafe Series had a theme: building a climate-resilient food system, based on the "How Do We Build a Climate Resilient Food System in New Hampshire? Six Ways that Sustainable Food Systems Build Climate Resilience" framework developed by NHFA and its Climate Action Team.

The NHFA network came together each month to learn about the impacts of climto change on a specific food system sector. The first half of each cafe featured a presentation from organizational leaders, policy makers, climate advocates, program coordinators, and others, while the second half offered time to network about what was shared during the presentation, and other related topics, allowing for resources and potential collaborations to be identified.
